

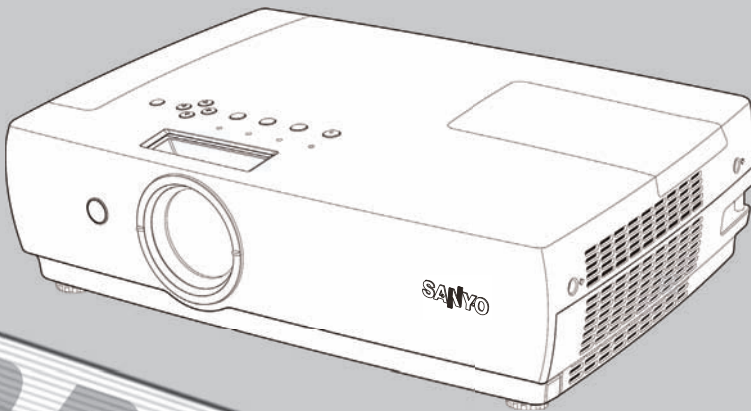

# Features and Design

This Multimedia Projector is designed with the most advanced technology for portability, durability, and ease of use. This projector utilizes built-in multimedia features, a palette of 16.77 million colors, and matrix liquid crystal display (LCD) technology.

## ◆ Compatibility

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The projector widely accepts various video and computer input signals including: Computers, 6 Color systems (PAL, SECAM, NTSC, NTSC4.43, PAL-M, and PAL-N), Component video, S-video and RGB scart.

## ◆ Simple Computer System Setting

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The projector has the Multi-scan system to conform to almost all computer output signals quickly. (p.27)

## ◆ Digital Zoom (for Computer)

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The digital zoom function expands (to approx. 16 times of the screen size) or compresses (to approx. a half of the screen size) the image size, allowing you to focus on crucial information during the presentation. (p.36)

## ◆ Blackboard Function

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Blackboard\* can be used as a projection screen.

\*The board color is limited to Green. (pp.31-32, 40-41)

## ◆ Colorboard Function

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This enables you to get the close color image to the color image projected on a white screen by selecting the similar color to the wall color from the preset four colors.

## ◆ Quick Termination

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The AC power cord can be unplugged immediately after turning off the projector without waiting for the termination of the cooling fan rotation.

## ◆ Auto setup Function

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This function enables Input search, Auto Keystone correction and AUTO PC adjustment by simple pressing the AUTO SETUP button on the top control or the AUTO SET button on the remote control. (p.46)

## ◆ Multilanguage Menu Display

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Operation menu is available in 16 languages: English, German, French, Italian, Spanish, Portuguese, Dutch, Swedish, Finnish, Polish, Hungarian, Romanian, Russian, Chinese, Korean, and Japanese. (p.45)

## ◆ Logo Function

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The Logo function allows you to customize the screen logo with the Logo functions. (pp.48-49) You can capture an image for the screen logo, choose a logo between provided and captured.

## ◆ Power Management

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The Power management function reduces power consumption and maintains the lamp life. (p.50)

## ◆ Lamp Control

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Brightness of the projection lamp can be selected. (pp.24,51)

## ◆ Security Function

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The Security function helps you to ensure the security with the Key lock (p.53) and the PIN code lock (pp.18, 53, 54) functions. You can lock the operation on the projector and the remote control. Also you can prevent unauthorized persons from using the projector.

## ◆ Closed Caption

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This is a printed version of the program sound or other information displayed on the screen. You can turn on the feature and switch the channels. (p.51)

## ◆ Automatic Filter Replacement Function

---

The projector monitors the condition of the filter and replaces a filter automatically when it detects the clogging.

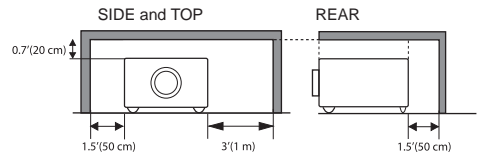

# Safety Instructions

All the safety and operating instructions should be read before the product is operated.

Read all of the instructions given here and retain them for later use. Unplug this projector from AC power supply before cleaning. Do not use liquid or aerosol cleaners. Use a damp cloth for cleaning.

Follow all warnings and instructions marked on the projector.

For added protection to the projector during a lightning storm, or when it is left unattended and unused for long periods of time, unplug it from the wall outlet. This will prevent damage due to lightning and power line surges.

Do not expose this unit to rain or use near water... for example, in a wet basement, near a swimming pool, etc...

Do not use attachments not recommended by the manufacturer as they may cause hazards.

Do not place this projector on an unstable cart, stand, or table. The projector may fall, causing serious injury to a child or adult, and serious damage to the projector. Use only with a cart or stand recommended by the manufacturer, or sold with the projector. Wall or shelf mounting should follow the manufacturer's instructions, and should use a mounting kit approved by the manufacturers.

An appliance and cart combination should be moved with care. Quick stops, excessive force, and uneven surfaces may cause the appliance and cart combination to overturn.



Slots and openings in the back and bottom of the cabinet are provided for ventilation, to ensure reliable operation of the equipment and to protect it from overheating.

The openings should never be covered with cloth or other materials, and the bottom opening should not be blocked by placing the projector on a bed, sofa, rug, or other similar surface. This projector should never be placed near or over a radiator or heat register.

This projector should not be placed in a built-in installation such as a book case unless proper ventilation is provided.

Never spill liquid of any kind on the projector. Do not install the projector near the ventilation duct of air-conditioning equipment.

This projector should be operated only from the type of power source indicated on the marking label. If you are not sure of the type of power supplied, consult your authorized dealer or local power company.

Do not overload wall outlets and extension cords as this can result in fire or electric shock. Do not allow anything to rest on the power cord. Do not locate this projector where the cord may be damaged by persons walking on it.

# Safety Instructions

## Air Circulation

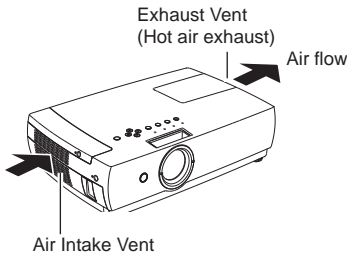
Openings in the cabinet are provided for ventilation and to ensure reliable operation of the product and to protect it from overheating, and these openings must not be blocked or covered.

### CAUTION

Hot air is exhausted from the exhaust vent. When using or installing the projector, the following precautions should be taken.

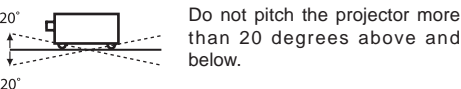
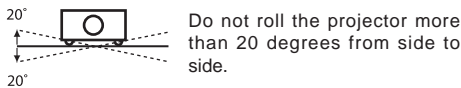
- Do not put any flammable object or spray can near the projector, hot air is exhausted from the ventilation holes.
- Keep the exhaust vent at least 3' (1 m) away from any objects.
- Do not touch a peripheral part of the exhaust vent, especially screws and metallic part. This area will become hot while the projector is being used.
- Do not put anything on the cabinet. Objects put on the cabinet will not only get damaged but also cause fire hazard by heat.

Cooling fans are provided to cool down the projector. The fans' running speed is changed according to the temperature inside the projector.



## Installing the Projector in Proper Position

Install the projector properly. Improper Installation may reduce the lamp life and cause a fire hazard.



Do not point the projector up to project an image.



Do not point the projector down to project an image.



Do not put the projector on either side to project an image.

## Moving the Projector

When moving the projector, close the slide shutter and retract the adjustable feet to prevent damage to the lens and cabinet. When the projector is not in use for an extended period, put it into a suitable case to protect the projector.

When handling the projector, do not drop, bump, subject it to strong forces, or put other things on the cabinet.



### USE CAUTION IN CARRYING OR TRANSPORTING THE PROJECTOR

- Do not drop or bump the projector, otherwise damages or malfunctions may result.
- When carrying the projector, use a suitable carrying case.
- Do not transport the projector by using a courier or transport service in an unsuitable transport case. This may cause damage to the projector. To transport the projector through a courier or transport service, consult your dealer for their information.
- Do not put the projector in a case before the projector is cooled enough.

## AC Power Cord Requirement

The AC Power Cord supplied with this projector meets the requirement for use in the country you purchased it.

### AC Power Cord for the United States and Canada:

AC Power Cord used in the United States and Canada is listed by the Underwriters Laboratories (UL) and certified by the Canadian Standard Association (CSA).

AC Power Cord has a grounding-type AC line plug. This is a safety feature to be sure that the plug will fit into the power outlet. Do not try to defeat this safety feature. Should you be unable to insert the plug into the outlet, contact your electrician.



### AC Power Cord for the United Kingdom:

This cord is already fitted with a moulded plug incorporating a fuse, the value of which is indicated on the pin face of the plug. 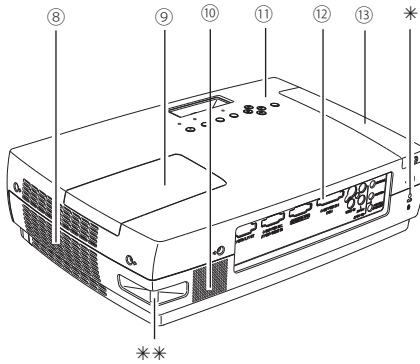

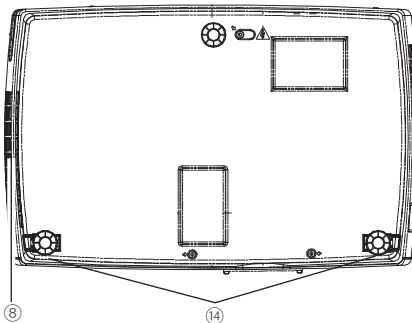

## Rear Terminal



## ① CONTROL PORT

When the projector is controlled by a computer, connect to this jack with serial control cable.

## ② COMPUTER IN 2 / COMPONENT IN

Connect output signal from a computer, RGB scart 21-pin video output or component video output to this terminal. (pp.14,16)

## ③ MONITOR OUT

This terminal can be used to output the incoming RGB signal from COMPUTER IN 1 / DVI-I terminal or COMPUTER IN 2/COMPONENT IN terminal to the other monitor (p.14).

## ④ COMPUTER IN 1 / DVI-I

Connect computer output (Digital/Analog DVI-I type) to this terminal (p.14).

## ⑤ S-VIDEO IN

Connect the S-VIDEO output signal from video equipment to this jack (p.15).

## ⑥ AUDIO OUT (VARIABLE)

Connect an external audio amplifier to this jack. (pp.14 - 16)

This terminal outputs sound from AUDIO IN terminal (⑦ or ⑧).

## ⑦ COMPUTER1/ COMPUTER2 COMPONENT AUDIO IN

Connect the audio output (stereo) from a computer or video equipment connected to ② or ④ to this jack. (pp.14, 16)

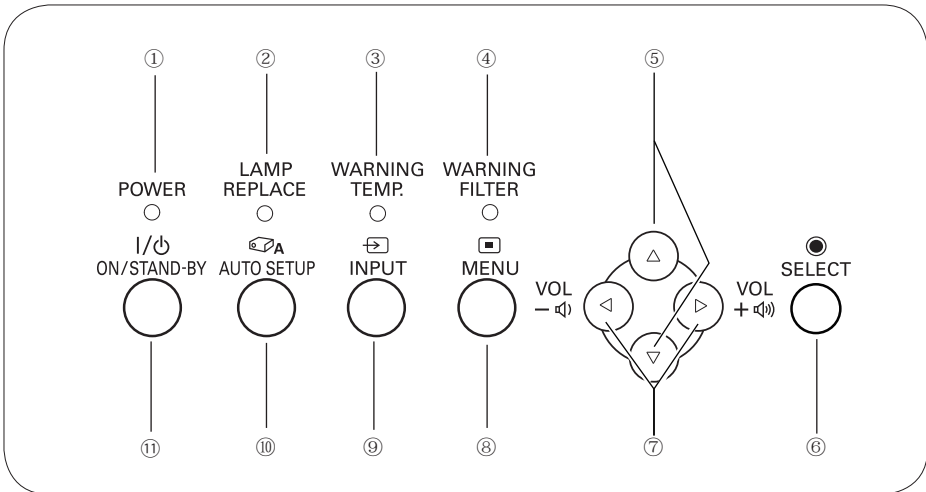
## ⑧ AUDIO IN

Connect the audio output from video equipment connected to ⑤ or ⑨ to this jack. (When the audio output is monaural, connect it to L (MONO) jack.). (p.15)

## ⑨ VIDEO IN

Connect the composite video output from video equipment to VIDEO jack. (p.15)

Top Control



① **POWER indicator**

- Light red when the projector is in stand-by mode.
- Light green during operations.
- Blink green in the Power management mode . (p.50)
- Blink red during cooling down.

② **LAMP REPLACE indicator**

Turn yellow when the life of the projection lamp draws to an end. (pp.60, 71-72)

③ **WARNING TEMP. indicator**

Emit a red light when the projector detects an abnormal condition. This also blinks red when the internal temperature of the projector exceeds the operating range. (pp.63, 71-72)

④ **WARNING FILTER indicator**

- Blink slow when the filter is being scrolled . (pp.57, 71)
- Blink fast when the filter cartridge is not installed. (pp.57, 72)
- Light orange when the clogging of the filter is detected or the filter counter reaches a time set in the timer setting, urging immediate filter/ filter cartridge replacement. (pp.55, 57, 72)

⑤ **POINT (▲▼) buttons**

- Select an item or adjust the value in the On-Screen Menu. (p.20)
- Pan the image in Digital zoom + mode. (p.36)

⑥ **SELECT button**

- Execute the selected item. (p.20)
- Expand or compress the image in Digital zoom mode. (p.36)

⑦ **POINT (◀▶) buttons**

- Select an item or adjust the value in the On-Screen Menu. (p.20)
- Pan the image in Digital zoom + mode. (p.36)

⑧ **MENU button**

Open or close the On-Screen Menu. (p.20)

Select an input source. (pp.25-26, 37-38)

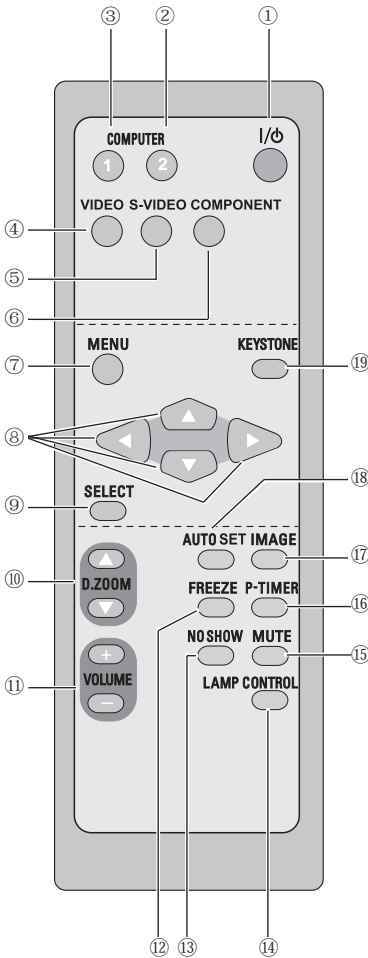

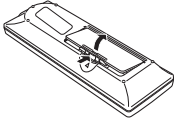

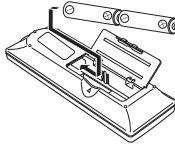

- 1** Open the battery compartment lid.

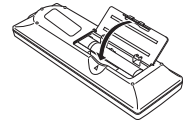


- 2** Install new batteries into the compartment.



**Two AA size batteries**  
For correct polarity (+ and -), be sure battery terminals are in contact with pins in the compartment.

- 3** Replace the compartment lid.

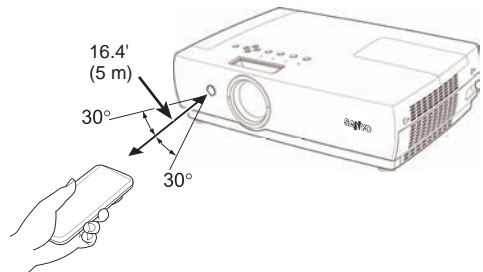


To ensure safe operation, please observe the following precautions:

- Use two (2) AA or LR6 type alkaline batteries.
- Always replace batteries in sets.
- Do not use a new battery with a used battery.
- Avoid contact with water or liquid.
- Do not expose the remote control to moisture or heat.
- Do not drop the remote control.
- If the battery has leaked on the remote control, carefully wipe the case clean and install new batteries.
- Risk of explosion if a battery is replaced by an incorrect type.
- Dispose of used batteries according to the instructions.

### Operating Range

Point the remote control toward the projector (Infrared Remote Receiver) when pressing any button. Maximum operating range for the remote control is about 16.4' (5 m) and 60° in front of the projector.



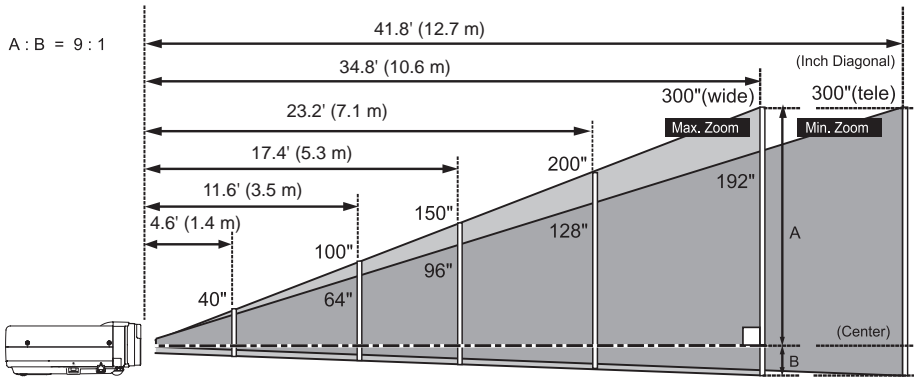
# Installation

## Positioning the Projector

For projector positioning, see the figures below. The projector should be set horizontally to the flat screen.

✓ **Notes:**

- The brightness in the room has a great influence on picture quality. It is recommended to limit ambient lighting in order to obtain the best image.
- The values shown below are approximate and may vary from the actual sizes.

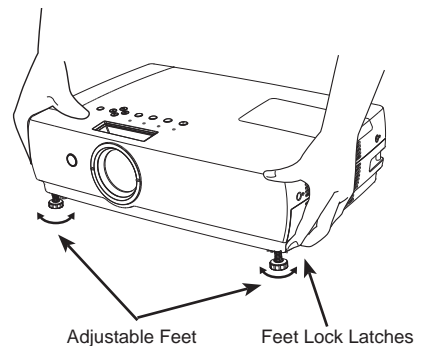

## Adjustable Feet

Projection angle can be adjusted up to 10.0 degrees with the adjustable feet.

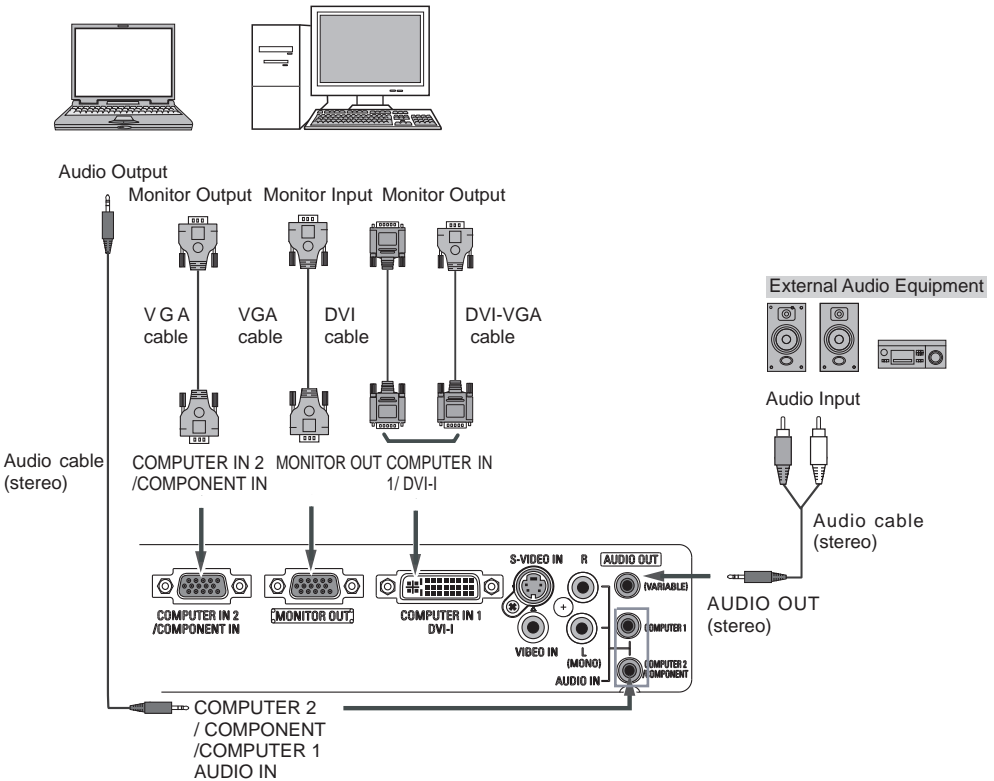
- 1 Lift the front of the projector and push the feet lock latches on the projector.
- 2 Release the feet lock latches to lock the adjustable feet and rotate the adjustable feet to adjust the position and tilt.
- 3 To retract the adjustable feet, lift the front of the projector and push and undo the feet lock latches. Keystone distortion of the projected image can be corrected with the remote control or menu operation. (pp.22, 46)



## Connecting to a Computer


### Cables used for connection

- DVI Cable or DVI-VGA Cable
  - VGA Cables (Mini D-sub 15 pin) (Only one cable is supplied.)
  - Audio Cables (Mini Plug: stereo)
- ( Not all the cables are supplied with this projector.)

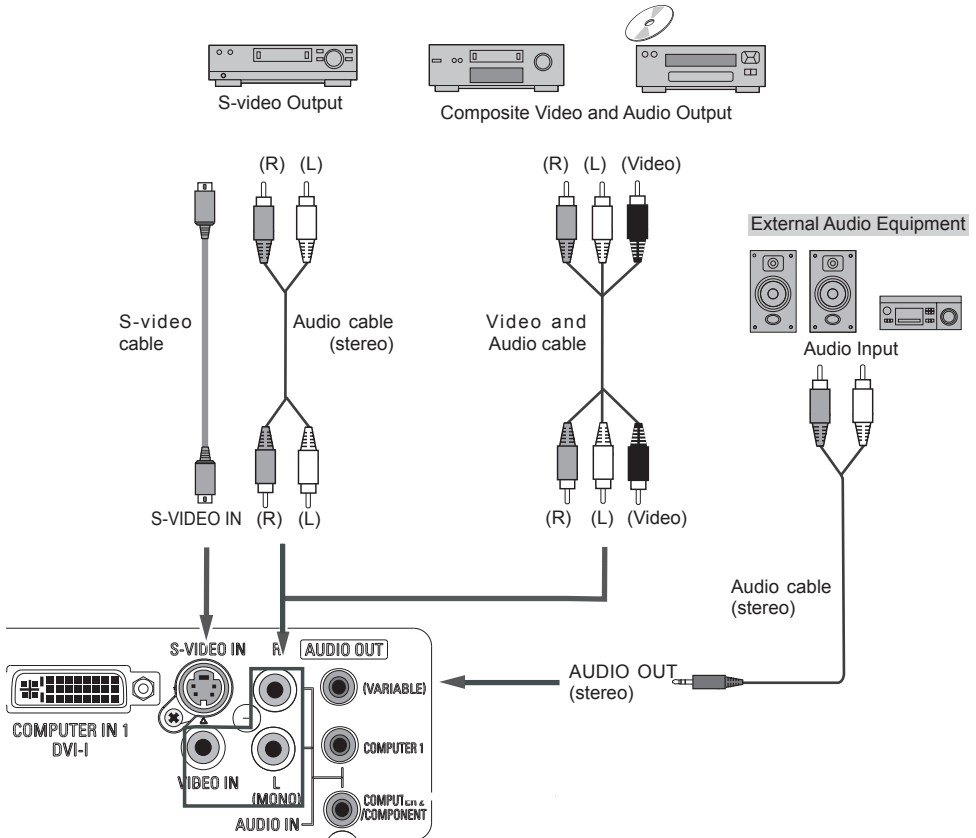
- Input sound to the COMPUTER 2 / COMPONENT AUDIO IN terminal when using the COMPUTER IN 2 / COMPONENT IN as input.
- Input sound to the COMPUTER 1 AUDIO IN terminal when using the COMPUTER IN 1 / DVI-I terminal as input.
- When the AUDIO OUT is plugged-in, the projector's built-in speaker is not available.

 Unplug the power cords of both the projector and external equipment from the AC outlet before connecting cables.

## Connecting to Video Equipment

Cables used for connection

- Video and Audio Cable (RCA x 3)
  - S-video Cable
  - Audio Cables (RCA x 2, Mini Plug: stereo)
- (Cables are not supplied with the projector.)

- When the AUDIO OUT is plugged-in, the projector's built-in speaker is not available.

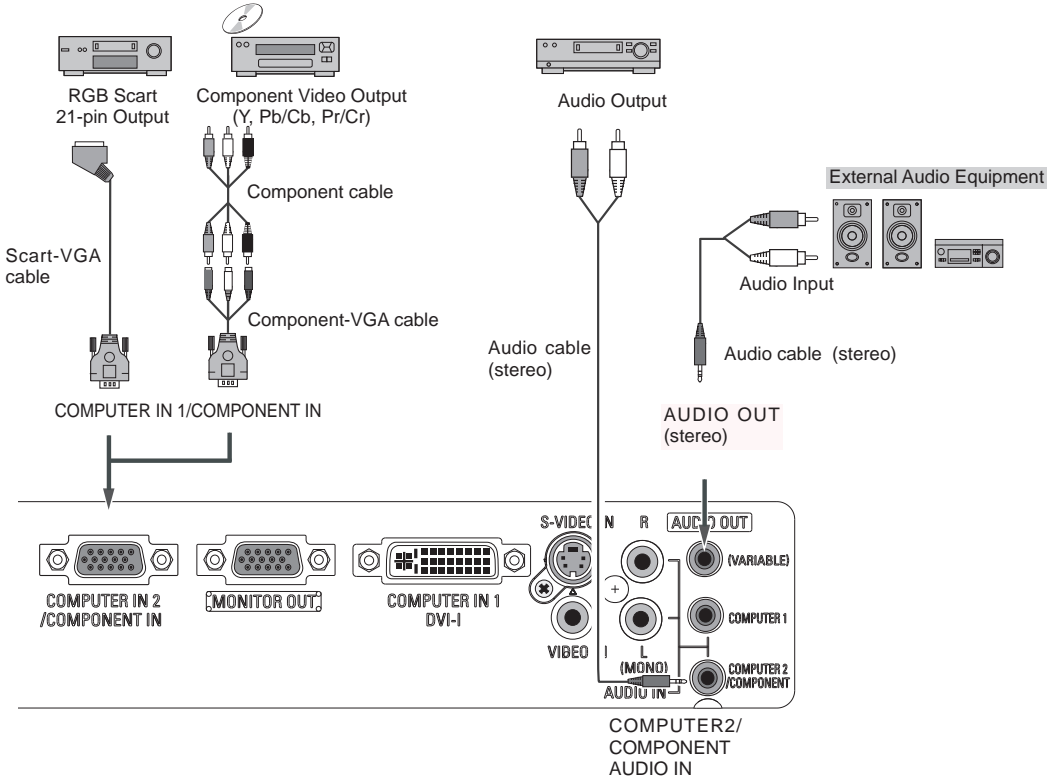

## Connecting to Component Video and RGB (Scart) Equipment

## Connecting the AC Power Cord

This projector uses nominal input voltages of 100-120 V or 200-240 V AC. This projector automatically selects the correct input voltage. It is designed to work with single-phase power systems having a grounded neutral conductor. To reduce the risk of electrical shock, do not plug into any other type of power system. Consult your authorized dealer or service station if you are not sure of the type of power being supplied. Connect the projector with all peripheral equipment before turning the projector on. (See pages 14-16 for connection)

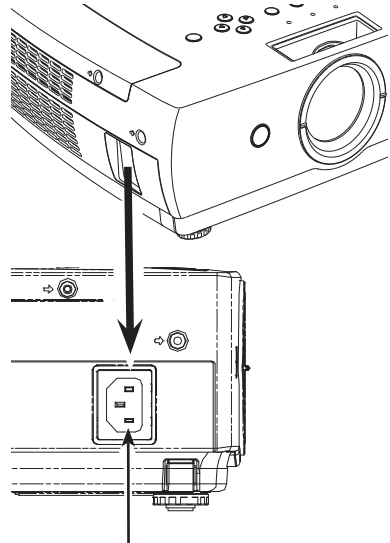





Unplug the AC power cord when the projector is not in use. When this projector is connected to an outlet with the AC power cord, it is in Stand-by mode and consumes a little electric power.

# Basic Operation

## Turning On the Projector

- 1 Complete peripheral connections (with a computer, VCR, etc.) before turning on the projector.
- 2 Connect the projector's AC power cord into an AC outlet. The POWER indicator becomes red.
- 3 Press the POWER ON/STAND-BY button on the top control or on the remote control. The POWER indicator becomes green and the cooling fans start to operate. The preparation display appears on the screen and the count down starts.
- 4 After the countdown, the input source that was selected the last time and the Lamp mode status icon (see page 51) appears on the screen.

If the projector is locked with a PIN code, PIN code Input Dialog Box appears. Enter the PIN code as instructed below.

### To Enter a PIN code

Select a number by pressing the Point ▲▼ buttons, and then press the Point ► button to fix the number and move the pointer. The number changes to "\*". If you fixed an incorrect number, move the pointer to the number you want to correct by pressing the Point ◀ button, and then select the correct number by pressing the Point ▲▼ buttons.

Repeat this step to complete entering a four-digit number. "1234" is set as the initial PIN code at the factory.

After entering the four-digit number, move the pointer to "Set" by pressing the Point ► button. Press the SELECT button so that you can start to operate the projector.

If you entered an incorrect PIN code, "PIN code" and the number (\* \*\* \*) turns red. Enter the correct PIN code all over again.

### What is PIN code?

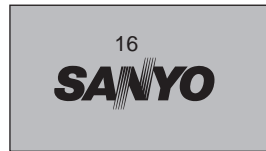
PIN (Personal Identification Number) code that allows the person who knows it to operate the projector. Setting a PIN code prevents unauthorized use of the projector.

A PIN code consists of a four-digit number. Refer to the PIN code lock function in the Setting on pages 53 and 54 for locking operation of the projector with your PIN code.



#### CAUTION ON HANDLING PIN CODE

If you forget your PIN code, the projector can no longer be started. Set a new PIN code with special care, write it down in column on page 79 of this manual, and keep it on hand. Should the PIN code be missing or forgotten, consult your dealer or service center.

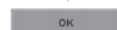
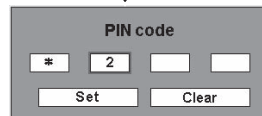
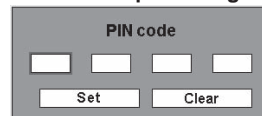

- If the PIN code number is not input for three minutes after the PIN code dialog box appeared, the projector is turned off automatically.


## Turning Off the Projector

- 1 Press the POWER ON/STAND-BY button on the top control or on the remote control, and a message "Power off?" appears on the screen.
- 2 Press the POWER ON/STAND-BY button again to turn off the projector. The POWER indicator starts to blink red, and the cooling fans keep running. (You can select the level of fan quietness and rotation speed. See page 55.)  
At this time you can disconnect the AC power cord even if the fans are still running.
- 3 When the projector has cooled down enough, the POWER indicator stops blinking and you can turn on the projector.



The message disappears after 4 seconds.

 TO MAINTAIN THE LIFE OF THE LAMP, ONCE YOU TURN THE PROJECTOR ON, WAIT AT LEAST FIVE MINUTES BEFORE TURNING IT OFF.

 DO NOT OPERATE THE PROJECTOR CONTINUOUSLY WITHOUT REST. CONTINUOUS USE MAY RESULT IN SHORTENING THE LAMP LIFE. TURN OFF THE PROJECTOR AND GIVE IT A REST ABOUT AN HOUR IN EVERY 24 HOURS.

### ✓ Notes:

- When the On start function is on, this projector is turned on automatically by connecting the AC power cord to an AC outlet. (p.51)
- The running speed of cooling fans is changed according to the temperature inside the projector.
- Do not put the projector in a case before the projector is cooled enough.
- If the WARNING TEMP. indicator blinks or emits a red light, see "Indicators and Projector Condition" on pages 71-72.
- While the POWER indicator is blinking, lamp is being cooled down and the projector cannot be turned on. Wait until the POWER indicator stops blinking to be turned on again.
- The fan rotation will terminate directly if the AC power cord is unplugged immediately after the projector is turned off.
- The projector can be turned on after the POWER indicator turns red. The waiting time to restart will be shortened when the normal power-off processing for fan cooling is completed, compared with the time the AC power cord is immediately unplugged after the power-off.

(Signal formats provided in this projector is shown on pages 73-74)

One of the following messages may appear when:

**Auto** The projector cannot recognize the connected signal conforming to the provided PC Systems. The message "Auto" is displayed on the PC System Menu icon and the Auto PC Adjustment function works to display proper images. If the image is not projected properly, a manual adjustment is required. (pp.29-30)

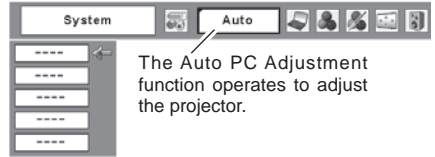

- The closed caption is unavailable when On-Screen menu and P-Timer are displayed.

 **Lamp control**

This function allows you to change brightness of the screen.

-  Normal . . . . . normal brightness
-  Auto . . . . . brightness according with the input signal
-  Eco . . . . . lower brightness reduces the lamp power consumption and extends the lamp life.

✓ **Note:**

Lamp mode cannot be changed for a while after turning on the projector. Lamp needs some time to stabilize after the power is turned on. Stored lamp mode will be active after the lamp is stabilized.

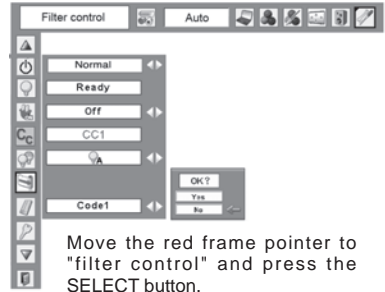
## Filter control

You can replace the filter with this function. Press the SELECT button at Filter control to display a confirmation box. To replace, press the SELECT button at "YES" and the electrically operated filter starts to scroll.

✓ **Note:**

- Filter replacement icon and "Please wait..." message appear on the screen when the filter is being scrolled.
- The filter cannot be rewound.
- When the filter is replaced, the total accumulated time of the filter use is automatically set to 0.

## Remote control

This projector provides two different remote control codes: the factory-set initial code (Code 1) and the secondary code (Code 2). This switching function prevents remote control interference when operating several projectors or video equipment at the same time.

When operating the projector in "Code 2", both the projector and the remote control must be switched to "Code 2".

### To change the code for the projector:

Select either "Code 1" or "Code 2" in this Setting Menu.

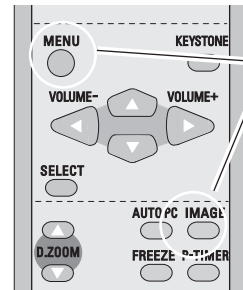
### To change the code for the remote control:

Press and hold both the MENU and IMAGE buttons together for 5 seconds or more. After changing the code, make sure the remote control operates properly.

✓ **Note:**

If the batteries are removed from the remote control for a long period of time, the remote control code will be reset.

Press and hold MENU and IMAGE buttons for more than 5 seconds.

 **Security (Key lock and PIN code lock settings)**

This function allows you to use Key lock and PIN code lock function to set the security for the projector operation.

 **Key lock**

This function locks operation of the top control or the remote control. It is useful to prevent operation by an unauthorized person.

-  . . . . . not locked.
-  . . . . . lock the operation of the top control. To unlock, use the remote control.
-  . . . . . lock the operation of the remote control. To unlock, use the top control.

If the top control accidentally becomes locked and you do not have the remote control or there is something wrong with your remote control, contact the dealer where you purchased the projector or the service center.

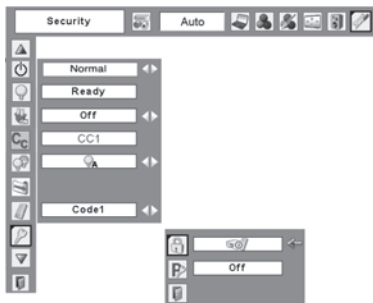
 **PIN code lock**

This function prevents the projector from being operated by an unauthorized person and provides the following settings for security options.

- Off . . . . . the projector is not locked with a PIN code.
- On1 . . . . . require to enter a PIN code every time turning on the projector.
- On2 . . . . . require to enter a PIN code to operate the projector once the power cord is disconnected; as long as the AC power cord is connected, the projector can be operated without a PIN code.

Whenever to change the PIN code lock setting or the PIN code (the four-digit number), you are required to enter the PIN code. The "1234" is set as the initial PIN code at the factory.

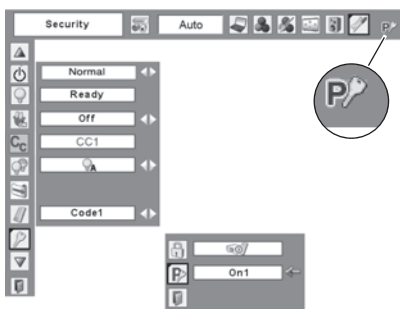
**Key lock**



Select Key lock. Choose one of the alternatives with the Point ▲ ▼ buttons and select [Yes] to activate it.

When the projector is locked with the PIN code, the PIN code lock mark appears on the menu bar.

## To Enter the PIN code

Select a number by pressing the Point ▲▼ buttons. And then press the Point ► button to fix the number and move the pointer. The number changes to "\*". If you fixed an incorrect number, move the pointer to the number you want to correct by pressing the Point ◀ button, and then select the correct number by pressing the Point ▲▼ buttons.

Repeat this step to complete entering a four-digit number.

After entering the four-digit number, move the pointer to "Set" by pressing the Point ► button. Press the SELECT button so that you can change the following PIN code lock settings.

If you entered an incorrect PIN code, "PIN code" and the number (\*\*\*\*) turns red. Enter a correct PIN code all over again.

## To Change the PIN code lock setting

Select Off, On1, or On2 with the Point ◀► buttons and then move the red frame pointer to "Quit" with the Point ▼ button. Press the SELECT button to close the dialog box.

**Fan**

This function provides the following alternatives in the cooling fans' operation after turning off the projector. (p.19)

- L1. . . . . normal operation
- L2. . . . . slower and lower-sound than the normal operation (L1), but it takes longer to cool the projector down.

**Warning log**

This function records anomalous operations while the projector is in operation and use it when diagnosing faults. Up to 10 warning logs are displayed with the latest warning message at the top of the list, followed by previous warning messages in chronological order.

**✓ Note:**

When the Factory default function is executed, all the warning log records will be deleted.

**Lamp counter**

This function is used to reset the lamp replacement counter. When replacing the projection lamp, reset the lamp replacement counter by using this function. See page 62 for operation.

**✓ Note:**

Do not reset the Lamp replacement counter without implementation of lamp replacement. Be sure to reset the Lamp replacement counter only after replacing the lamp.

This icon appears on the screen when the end of lamp life is reached.

**✓ Note:**

This icon also appears at turning on and selecting input source.

## Filter counter

This function is used to set a frequency for the filter replacement.

Use the Point ▲▼ buttons to move the red frame pointer to Filter counter and then press the SELECT button. A dialog box appears showing the Used time option and the Scrolls remaining option.

**Used Time . . . . .** Show the total accumulated time of the filter use, timer setting option and the Reset options. When the projector reaches a time set in the timer setting, the Filter replacement icon (Fig. 1) appears on the screen and the total accumulated time turns red, indicating that the filter replacement is necessary. If the filter is out of scroll and the projector reaches a time set in the timer setting, Fig. 2 appears on the screen, indicating that the filter cartridge replacement is necessary.

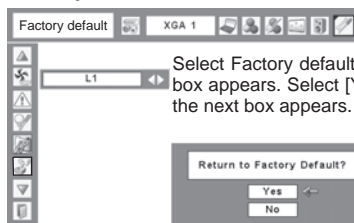
Fig.4 Filter cartridge replacement icon

**Scrolls remaining. . . . .** Show the scroll counter and the Reset options. When the filter scroll is counted down to 1 (Scroll counter on the screen is showing "0 scroll(s)"), the last scroll icon (Fig. 3) appears on the screen. When the filter scroll is counted down to 0, the Filter cartridge replacement icon (Fig. 4) appears on the screen and the WARNING FILTER indicator lights orange, indicating that the filter cartridge replacement is necessary.

To set a timer, press the SELECT button on Used time option. Move the red arrow pointer to the timer setting option and use the Point ◀▶ buttons to select from (Off/400H/700H/1000H) depending on the use environment. When replacing the Filter cartridge, reset the Filter counter and the Scroll counter (p.59).

✓Note:

- Do not reset the counter(s) when the filter or the filter cartridge are not replaced.
- Timer setting notifies that the filter needs replacement. To replace the filter, use the filter control function (p.52).

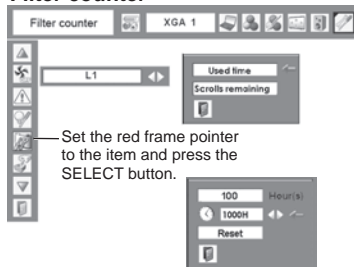
## Factory default

This function returns all setting values except for the user logo, PIN code lock, Logo PIN code lock, and the lamp counter to the factory default settings.

# Maintenance and Care

## Filter Instructions

Filter prevents dust from accumulating on the optical elements inside the projector. Should the filter becomes clogged with dust particles, it will reduce cooling fans' effectiveness and may result in internal heat buildup and adversely affect the life of the projector. This projector has an electrically operated filter which helps you to replace the filter easily. The projector monitors the condition of the filter at all time and replaces a filter with a new one automatically when it detects the clogging.

If the projector reaches a time set in the timer setting (p.56), a Filter replacement icon (Fig.1) appears on the screen and the WARNING FILTER indicator on the top control lights up . When you see this icon, replace the filter as soon as possible (p.52) and reset the Filter counter (p.59). If the filter is out of scroll and the projector reaches a time set in the timer setting, Fig. 2 appears on the screen, indicating that the filter cartridge replacement is necessary.

When the filter scroll is counted down to 1, the Last scroll icon (Fig.3) appears on the screen, indicating that there is one scroll left in the filter cartridge (p.56).

If the projector detects that the filter is clogged and no scroll is left in the filter cartridge, a Filter cartridge replacement icon (Fig. 4) appears on the screen and the WARNING FILTER indicator on the top control lights up . When you see this icon, replace the filter cartridge (p.58) and reset the Filter counter (p.59) and the Scroll counter (p.59).

When the filter is being scrolled using the Filter control function in the setting menu (p.52), a Filter replacement icon and "Please wait..." message (Fig.5) appear on the screen and the WARNING FILTER indicator blinks slow (approx. 2 seconds ON, 2 seconds OFF).

The WARNING FILTER indicator blinks fast when the projector detects an abnormal condition, the filter cartridge is not installed properly, or the filter scroll is not working properly .

### ✓ Notes:

- Fig.1, Fig.2, Fig.3, Fig. 4 and Fig.5 will not appear when the Display function is set to "Off" (p.47), during "Freeze" (p.23), or "No show" (p.24).
- The filter cannot be rewind.
- The filter can be scrolled 9 times since the filter cartridge has 10 scrolls.
- The filter cartridge is disposable. Do not clean and reuse the filter cartridge.
- Do not expose the filter cartridge to water or liquid, or it may cause a breakdown.
- Replace the filter cartridge after all the scroll is used up. If you replace the filter cartridge when there are some scrolls left in the filter cartridge, the filter counter and the scroll counter do not recognize the correct number of remaining scrolls and the reset function cannot work properly. It may cause a breakdown.
- Do not use the filter cartridge with other projector. The filter counter and the scroll counter do not recognize the correct number of remaining scrolls of the used filter cartridge and the reset function cannot work properly. It may cause a breakdown.

- Make sure that the projection lamp is turn off when you are replacing the filter cartridge. If you replace the filter cartridge when the projection lamp is turn on, the projector will be shut down automatically for safety purpose
- When you forget to reset the filter counter, the projector cannot recognize the correct number of remaining scrolls and may cause a breakdown.
- Do not forget to reset the filter counter and the scroll counter in the setting menu after replacing the filter cartridge. If you forget to reset the filter counter and the scroll counter, the projector cannot recognize the correct number of remaining scrolls and may cause a breakdown.
- When the projector is kept used for 3 minutes without getting the filter cartridge replaced after the Fig.4 appears on the screen, the projector is turned off automatically to prevent the damage of optical components.

### Replacing the Filter Cartridge

- 1 Turn off the projector, and unplug the AC power cord from the AC outlet.
- 2 First, clean up the dust on the projector and around the air vents.
- 3 Loosen 2 screws of the filter cover with a screwdriver and open the filter cover.
- 4 Rotate the handle of the filter and pull out the filter cartridge.
- 5 Put the new one back into the position and rotate back the handle. Make sure that the filter cartridge is properly and fully inserted.
- 6 Close the filter cover and tighten the 2 screws back into position.
- 7 Connect the AC power cord to the projector and turn on the projector.
- 7 Reset the filter counter and the scroll counter (p.59).



#### CAUTION

Make sure the filter cartridge is inserted in the projector. If the filter cartridge is not inserted, the projector cannot be turned on.

Do not put anything into the air vents. Doing so may result in malfunction of the projector.

#### RECOMMENDATION

We recommend avoiding dusty/smoky environments when operating the projector. Usage in these environments may cause a poor image quality.

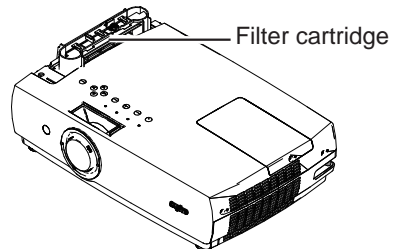
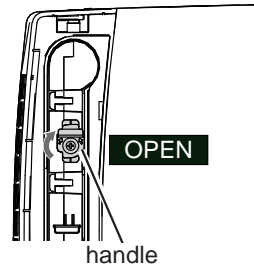
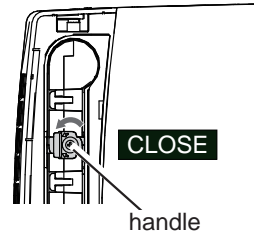
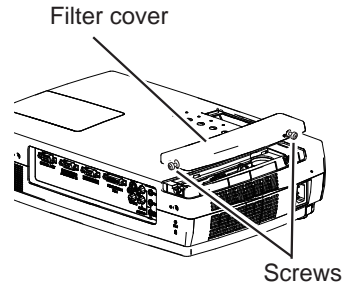
When using the projector under dusty or smoky conditions, dust may accumulate on a lens, liquid crystal panels, or optical elements inside the projector. Such condition may degrade the quality of the projected image.

When the symptoms above are noticed, contact your authorized dealer or service station for proper cleaning.

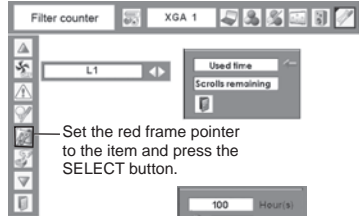

- 1 Press the MENU button to display the On-Screen Menu. Use the Point ◀▶ buttons to move the red frame pointer to the Setting Menu icon.
- 2 Use the Point ▲▼ buttons to move the red frame pointer to Filter counter and then press the SELECT button. A dialog box appears showing the Used time option and the Scrolls remaining option. Use the Point ▲▼ buttons to select Used time.
- 3 Used time shows the total accumulated time of the filter use, a timer setting option, and the Reset option. Select Reset and the "Filter counter Reset?" appears. Select [Yes] to continue.

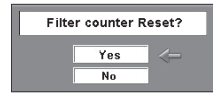

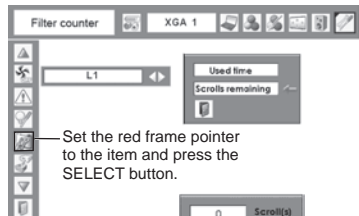

- 3 Scroll(s) remaining shows the number of the remaining scrolls and the Reset option. Select Reset and the "Scroll counter Reset?" appears. Select [Yes] to continue.

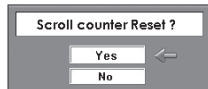

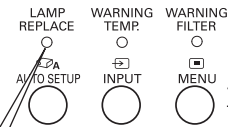

### Lamp Replacement

When the life of the projection lamp of this projector draws to an end, the Lamp replacement icon appears on the screen and LAMP REPLACE indicator lights yellow. Replace the lamp with a new one promptly. The timing when the LAMP REPLACE indicator should light is depending on the lamp mode.

Allow a projector to cool, for at least 45 minutes before you open the Lamp cover. The inside of the projector can become very hot.



### CAUTION

For continued safety, replace with a lamp of the same type. Do not drop a lamp or touch a glass bulb! The glass can shatter and may cause injury.



### CAUTION

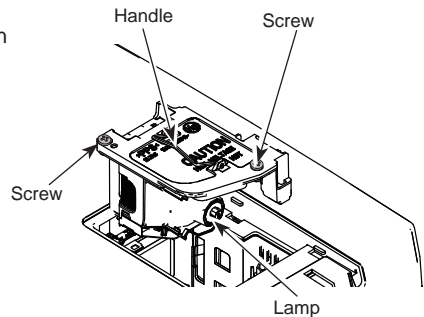
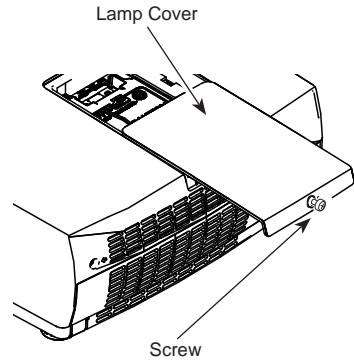
When replacing the lamp because it has stopped illuminating, there is a possibility that the lamp may be broken.

If replacing the lamp of a projector which has been installed on the ceiling, you should always assume that the lamp is broken, and you should stand to the side of the lamp cover, not underneath it. Remove the lamp cover gently. Small pieces of glass may fall out when the lamp cover is opened. If pieces of glass get into your eyes or mouth, seek medical advice immediately.

Refer to the next page for replacing a lamp.

Follow these steps to replace the lamp.

- 1** Turn off the projector and disconnect the AC power cord. Allow the projector to cool for at least 45 minutes.
- 2** Loosen the screw with a screwdriver, slide and open the lamp cover.
- 3** Loosen 2 screws of the lamp with a screwdriver and pull out the lamp upwards vertically by grasping the handle.
- 4** Replace the lamp with a new one and tighten the 2 screws back into position. Make sure that the lamp is set properly. Replace the lamp cover and tighten the screw.
- 5** Connect the AC power cord to the projector and turn on the projector.
- 6** **Reset the lamp replacement counter.**

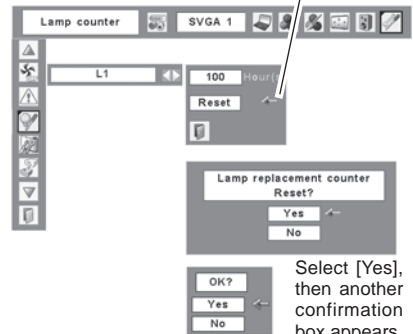

### Resetting the Lamp Counter

Be sure to reset the Lamp replacement counter after the lamp is replaced. When the Lamp replacement counter is reset, the LAMP REPLACE indicator stops lighting.

- 1 Turn the projector on, press the MENU button to display the On-Screen Menu. Press the Point ◀▶ buttons to move the red frame pointer to the Setting Menu icon.
- 2 Press the Point ▲▼ buttons to move the red frame pointer to the Lamp counter function and then press the SELECT button. The first dialog box appears and shows the total accumulated time of the lamp usage and the reset option. If you select "Reset", a "Lamp replacement counter Reset?" message appears. Select [Yes] to continue.
- 3 Another confirmation dialog box appears, select [Yes] to reset the Lamp replacement counter.

To reset the lamp counter, move the pointer to Reset and then press the SELECT button. "Lamp replacement counter Reset?" dialog box is displayed.



Select [Yes] again to reset the lamp counter.

Select [Yes], then another confirmation box appears.

#### ✓ Note:

Do not reset the Lamp replacement counter without implementation of lamp replacement. Be sure to reset the Lamp replacement counter only after replacing the lamp.



### LAMP HANDLING PRECAUTIONS

This projector uses a high-pressure lamp which must be handled carefully and properly. Improper handling may result in accidents, injury, or create a fire hazard.

- Lamp life may differ from lamp to lamp and according to the environment of use. There is no guarantee of the same life for each lamp. Some lamps may fail or terminate their life in a shorter period of time than other similar lamps.
- If the projector indicates that the lamp should be replaced, i.e., if the LAMP REPLACE indicator lights up, replace the lamp with a new one IMMEDIATELY after the projector has cooled down. (Follow carefully the instructions in the Lamp Replacement section of this manual.) Continuous use of the lamp with the LAMP REPLACE indicator lighted may increase the risk of lamp explosion.
- A Lamp may explode as a result of vibration, shock or degradation as a result of hours of use as its lifetime draws to an end. Risk of explosion may differ according to the environment or conditions in which the projector and lamp are being used.

#### IF A LAMP EXPLODES, THE FOLLOWING SAFETY PRECAUTIONS SHOULD BE TAKEN.

If a lamp explodes, disconnect the projector's AC plug from the AC outlet immediately. Contact an authorized service station for a checkup of the unit and replacement of the lamp. Additionally, check carefully to ensure that there are no broken shards or pieces of glass around the projector or coming out from the cooling air circulation holes. Any broken shards found should be cleaned up carefully. No one should check the inside of the projector except those who are authorized trained technicians and who are familiar with projector service. Inappropriate attempts to service the unit by anyone, especially those who are not appropriately trained to do so, may result in an accident or injury caused by pieces of broken glass.

## WARNING TEMP. indicator

The WARNING TEMP. indicator shows the state of the function which protects the projector. Check the state of the WARNING TEMP. indicator and the POWER indicator to take proper maintenance.

### The projector is shut down and the WARNING TEMP. indicator is blinking red.

When the temperature inside the projector reaches a certain level, the projector is automatically shut down to protect the inside of the projector. The POWER indicator is blinking while the projector is being cooled down. When the projector has cooled down sufficiently (to its normal operating temperature), it can be turned on again by pressing the POWER ON/STAND-BY button.

✓ **Note:**

After the temperature inside the projector returns to normal, the WARNING TEMP. indicator still continues to blink. When the projector is turned on again, the WARNING TEMP. indicator stops blinking.

#### Then check the matters below:

- Did you provide appropriate space for the projector to be ventilated? Check the installing condition to see if ventilation slots are not blocked.
- Is the projector not installed near the ventilation duct of air-conditioning equipment which may be hot? Install the projector away from the ventilation duct of air-conditioning equipment.
- Is the air filter clean? Replace the filter periodically. (p.52)

### The projector is shut down and the WARNING TEMP. indicator emits a red light.

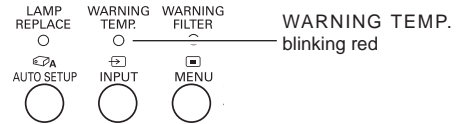
When the projector detects an abnormal condition, it is automatically shut down to protect the inside and the WARNING TEMP. indicator becomes red. In this case, disconnect the AC power cord and reconnect it, and then turn the projector on once again for check. If the projector cannot be turned on and the WARNING TEMP. indicator emits a red light, disconnect the AC power cord and contact the service station for check and repair.



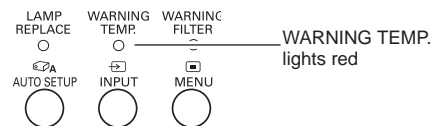
**CAUTION**

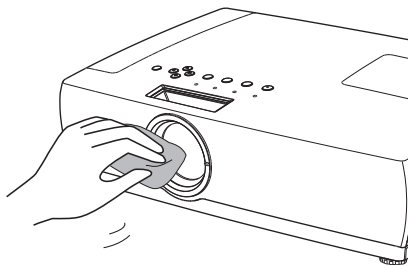

### Cleaning the Lens Cover

Follow these steps to clean the lens cover.

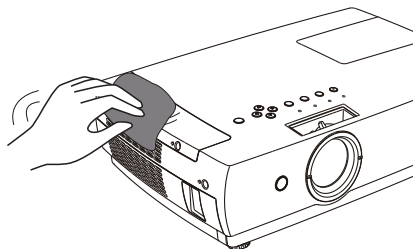
- 1** Disconnect the AC power cord before cleaning.
- 2** Softly wipe the lens cover with a cleaning cloth that contains a small amount of non-abrasive camera lens cleaner, or use lens cleaning paper or a commercially available air blower to clean the lens. Avoid using an excessive amount of cleaner. Abrasive cleaners, solvent, or other harsh chemicals might scratch the surface.



### Cleaning the Projector Cabinet

Follow these steps to clean the projector cabinet.

- 1** Disconnect the AC power cord before cleaning.
- 2** Softly wipe the projector body with a soft, dry cleaning cloth. When it is heavily soiled, use a small amount of mild detergent and finish with a soft, dry cleaning cloth. Avoid using an excessive amount of cleaner. Abrasive cleaners, solvent, or other harsh chemicals might scratch the surface.
- 3** When the projector is not in use, put the projector in an appropriate carrying case to protect it from dust and scratches.

Before calling your dealer or service center for assistance, check the items below once again.

- Make sure you have properly connected the projector to peripheral equipment as described on pages 14-16.
- Make sure all equipment is connected to AC outlet and the power is turned on.
- When you operate the projector with a computer and it does not project an image, restart the computer.
